OLYMPIC RECORD PROGRESSIONS

Since 1964, the "large hill" has been designed to create jumps of 120 metres measured to the Norm Point of the hill. Prior to 1964, there was only one ski jumping event in the Olympics and the hills were of various sizes. The marks from 1924-60 are listed with the Large Hill, as it was the only hill jumped at the Olympics in those years.

Ski jumps are traditionally measured only metrically to the nearest half metre. In the following, the marks are given in the metric distance, and in the Imperial conversion, to the nearest foot. The columns list respectively: metres, feet, placement in competition, number of the jump (one or two), athlete's name, athlete's nation, site of Olympics, and year of Olympics.
