Siblings on the Podium

For some odd reason, this has happened a lot at the Winter Olympic Games. Specifically, 60 times siblings of some variant have stood together on the medial podium at the Winter Olympics. Usually this has occurred in team events, such as brother-sister in figure skating pairs, or brothers in ice hockey. However, 7 times, siblings have shared a Winter Olympic podium in an individual event, as in the following. There are a lot of sibling combinations competing at Sochi – the United States has 7, there are the 3 Dufour-Lapointe sisters for Canada in freestyle skiing, the three Gasparin sisters for Switzerland in biathlon, and the three Wells brothers for New Zealand in freestyle – so we may see some additions to this list in Sochi.
